



Watch the video lesson. Watch it together as a family or play it on your phone while you are going around town.



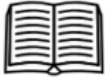
Guide someone who is limited in their verbal or reading abilities through a devotional.



Reinforce the video lesson and make a memory by picking an activity to do together!



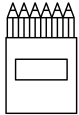
Listen to a Spotify playlist to set the tone in your home and reinforce the truths of the lesson.

## Lesson Recap



In Genesis 1:1–31 we learn that God is the amazing Creator of everything! First, He set up the foundation of the world—day and night, sky and sea, land and plants (Genesis 1:1–13).

Then He filled it all up with incredible things: the sun, moon, and billions of stars (Genesis 1:14–19), all kinds of fish and birds (Genesis 1:20–23), and finally animals and people (Genesis 1:24–26).

When He was done, God looked at everything He made and said it was “very good” (Genesis 1:31). And here’s the really cool part—God didn’t just make enough; He made more than we could ever count or imagine! The Bible says He can do “far more abundantly than all we ask or think” (Ephesians 3:20). When you look up at the stars or think about all the animals God created, remember—if He cares about the smallest sparrow, He definitely cares about you (Luke 12:6–7)!

## Habit Builder



Every day we can do small things to remember God’s plan and His care for us. In the morning, look at the sky and thank God for making the world and holding it all. Each day, take a moment to notice one thing in creation—maybe the sunrise, a bird outside, the stars at night, or even your pet—and thank God for making it. As you do, remind yourself: “If God made this and cares for it, He cares even more for me.” These quiet moments can help calm your heart and remind you that you are never forgotten or alone. You could even keep a small Creation Journal where you draw or write down the things you notice. Over time, it becomes a collection of reminders that the Creator of everything also loves you deeply and takes care of you every single day.
