Lesson 104: Isaiah 53, Revelation 21:5-7

Revelation 21:5-7

And he who was seated on the throne said, “Behold, I am making all things new.” Also he said, “Write this down, for these words are trustworthy and true.” And he said to me, “It is done! I am the Alpha and the Omega, the beginning and the end. To the thirsty I will give from the spring of the water of life without payment. The one who conquers will have this heritage, and I will be his God and he will be my son.

Some days are heavy with sorrow and discouragement, and it’s easy to lose sight of hope. But God’s Word reminds us that He is “making all things new” (Revelation 21:5), and that “if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation; the old has passed away, behold, the new has come” (2 Corinthians 5:17).

You are not defined by your past or your failures. In Christ, you are renewed—loved, forgiven, and given a new identity rooted in His righteousness. Walk in confidence today knowing that you belong to Him, and that His Spirit empowers you to live as His new creation.

Devotional Study 1



Lesson 104: Isaiah 53, Revelation 21:5-7

Isaiah 53:4-6

Surely He has borne our griefs and carried our sorrows; yet we esteemed Him stricken, smitten by God and afflicted. But He was pierced for our transgressions; He was crushed for our iniquities; upon Him was the chastisement that brought us peace, and with His wounds we are healed. All we like sheep have gone astray; we have turned—everyone—to his own way; and the Lord has laid on Him the iniquity of us all.

Romans 3:23, 6:23

for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God.

For the wages of sin is death, but the free gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord.

Our independent nature often tells us we can handle life on our own. We try to earn our way or make ourselves good enough to gain God’s love. Yet Scripture reminds us that “all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God” and that “the wages of sin is death” (Romans 3:23, 6:23). No amount of effort can make us right with God.

But in His great kindness, God did what we could not do.
